FOOTNOTES FROM THE BOROUGH

- During a SNOW EMERGENCY all vehicles must be removed from the street. The snow emergency will be announced on your local radio and TV stations, WFMZ, B104, and 69 NEWS. Vehicles will be towed.
- You have 24 hours in which to clear your sidewalks after a snowfall. If you live near a hydrant, please take five minutes and shovel around it.
- It is unlawful to push or shovel snow from your property onto a public street in the Borough. Violators will be cited.
- It would be helpful for snowplowing if you would place reflectors along your property edge for those along Dogwood Lane, Old Easton Road, Lincoln Avenue and other streets without curbing.
- If you park your cars on any public roadways, please remove your cars from the roadway during a snow storm so the plows can clean the whole street and avoid damage to vehicles.
- Borough residents with special needs, please contact us at 610 759-2995 with your name and address so we can add you to our Emergency Response List.



- In early February there will be a new face in our Police Department. Patrolman William Cope Jr. is awaiting clearance before hitting the street. While we do not have full time police coverage, the police presence has increased and is spread more evenly over a 24 hour period.
- The Police Department is now equipped to temporarily contain a lost pet until its owner can be located. This may save the pet from being taken to the SPCA, the Borough from paying the drop-off fee, and the owner from paying the fee to retrieve their pet from the SPCA. Please have identification tags on your pets, (cats and dogs), and make every effort to protect and contain them. There is no guarantee that your pet will allow an officer to capture it if it is lost and afraid. The traffic and elements do not bode well for their safety.
- The Borough office is not yet fully staffed. There are window hours Tuesdays and Fridays 8:30AM to 1:00PM, Thursday afternoons from 2:30PM to 6:00PM.





HOPES ARE HIGH FOR GRANT AWARDS


The Borough has applied for four grants offered through the Northampton County Uncommitted Funds Municipal Gaming Grant of 2010. They are as follows:

- 1. In the first application the Police Department has requested \$30,000 under Municipal Emergency Services category, to replace the 2004 Dodge which has high mileage and has been plagued with electrical issues from the time of purchase. The Department has two vehicles; the 2004 and a 2005 Ford.
- 2. In a second application under the same category, the Police Department has requested \$7,500 for a computer network to interface with other police and governmental entities.
- A third application was submitted from the Borough for \$45,000 toward the razing of Memorial Hall under the Municipal Infrastructure Improvements category.
- 4. The fourth application submitted under Municipal Public Works requests \$39,980 toward the purchase of a 2011 Ford 550 chassis and a Switch-and-Go* mechanism which allows the same truck chassis to utilize multiple body types, eliminating the need for multiple trucks. Currently the Borough owns a 1989 Ford 1 ton dump, a 2009 1 ton dump, and a 1998 Ford 800 dump truck which is the main heavy snowplowing vehicle. It is in fair to poor condition and will need to be replaced soon.

The Borough has committed \$5,000 toward the police car grant, and \$15,530 toward the public works truck grant. The car grant is being considered in the top group of county-wide applications, and we are awaiting word on the others. The total funds available from this round of grants is +/- \$177,000. Obviously we will need some Devine intervention, but our hopes remain high.

Notes:

- 1. Millage calculations are for illustration only. Boro expenses are paid from General Fund revenues received in the fiscal year.
- 2. Sewer expenses are paid from Sewer Fund revenues and are not considered in any millage calculations.
- 3. 18.05 would be the necessary millage rate if all Boro expenses except Sewer (WWTP) were paid from property taxes only.

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











GRID-JIG PUZZLE
